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2020 was a challenging and unprecedented year for everyone around the globe. Action Housing was not immune to the impacts of the pandemic. We were among the first community organizations to prioritize safety by closing our offices to the public, and quickly modifying our service delivery approach to continue to meet the needs of our clients as best as possible. Despite working with fewer clients over this past year, we have been far from idle. Client needs over the past few years have become more complex and require more time and deeper interventions.

Action Housing moved offices at the end of July, which required extra planning and co-ordination due to the pandemic. We look forward to showing off our new home once most of the Ottawa population is vaccinated and we are able to offer in-person service again.

We kept abreast with all the changes related to the *Residential Tenancies Act*, Service Manager directives to the affordable housing providers, the rent freeze, the multiple eviction moratoriums and the modified operations of the Landlord and Tenant Board. Not only were we on the forefront of this information as the ground shifted beneath our feet, we ensured to be the vector to inform other organizations of these changes as well as their impact by sending emails and by giving presentations to front-line workers across the City. We also kept in touch with community partners across the province, often translating information bulletins, and ensuring our website contained the most recent housing-related information possible.

Action Housing was also involved in many housing-related research projects, and focused on multiple advocacy initiatives. Marie-Josée wrote letters and presented many deputations on behalf of Action-Housing at the Municipal and Provincial level related to housing issues. She was also involved with a few initiatives at the Federal level through the Canadian Housing Renewal Association and the National Right to Housing Network.

Action Housing would like to thank our community partners who are always available to discuss greater systemic issues and brainstorm solutions. Thank you to the Housing Services branch of the City of Ottawa for their leadership and tireless work in fighting for and making COVID-related grants available to community agencies across the city. We are also grateful for their openness and availability to allow us to report and offer possible solutions for COVID-related challenges that threatened our clients' housing.

We are also grateful for our supportive Board of Directors who trusted us to quickly pivot with our service delivery, and to put various COVID-related plans in place.

Finally, we are proud of our colleagues for their courage, tenacity and adaptability over the past year as they continued to provide services while prioritizing the safety of our clients and our team. Doing social work is difficult at best, never mind over the phone, during a pandemic and while everyone is experiencing a level of chronic anxiety. It is always an honour to serve with you. Many, many thanks!

Looking forward, there are still so many unknowns. One thing is clear, Action Housing will continue to be at the forefront, doing whatever is possible in terms of service delivery and advocacy to address this housing crisis and fight the many inequities further exposed and amplified by this pandemic that our clients face every single day.
