2022 ANNUAL REPORT

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As for the years preceding it, the year 2022 was very eventful for Action Housing, and it is with great effort and a strong resolution that the team was able to overcome the obstacles brought on by the end of the pandemic and a return to a new version of normalcy. The organization also went through a change of director, with the departure of its Executive Director, Marie-Josée Houle, who had been at the helm of Action Housing since March 2017. During her mandate, the organization continued to operate at full capacity, to better its services and to advocate for better housing policies in Ottawa, and this despite the pandemic.

Marie-Josée's departure was deeply felt by many members of the community, as well as by the Action Housing team members, who rallied under the leadership of one of their own. Anne Smith, Supervisor, Paralegal and employee of the organization since its very beginnings, took over the role of Interim Director for the first half of the year. This allowed for continuity in essential service delivery and clients' access to resources. Supported by the Board of Administrators, the team was able to continue its mission of offering affordable housing supports to low and moderate income individuals in Ottawa.

August saw the arrival of Nathalie Maione, the newly appointed Executive Director, and under the guidance of Anne as well as the entire team, her learning and training continued on for the months following her arrival. We will forever be grateful for the warm welcome and the exceptional support shown to Nathalie by the team during her formative months.

In the realm of community services, it is often said that challenges only make you stronger; it goes without saying that the astronomical rise in rental housing and living costs, the precarity of the employment market and the general lack of financial resources to adequately address the many needs of our clients have all been difficult trials for Action Housing during this past year. But, motivated by its passion and its mission, the Action Housing team persists, and is currently working on a post-pandemic operational approach, all while continuing to collaborate with community partners on innovative projects that will better meet clients' needs.

2023 is already a very busy year, and we continue to hold out hope that the systemic changes needed will materialize, so that every member of our community can access a stable, safe, affordable home that suits their needs.

In closing, we wish all the success and happiness to Marie-Josée in her new position, and we sincerely thank Action Housing's team and Board of Administrators for their tireless work. It is absolutely thanks to them that Action Housing can continue its efforts with the most vulnerable members of our community.

ABOUT ACTION HOUSING

Since 1989, Action Housing has been offering bilingual services pertaining to affordable housing and homelessness prevention in Ottawa, in partnership with Community Health and Resource Centres and many other organizations serving the community.

OUR MISSION

Action Housing is a registered charity devoted to helping and providing the necessary tools to low- and moderate-income individuals and families to access and maintain safe, adequate and affordable housing.

SERVICES

- ✓ Housing loss prevention services;
- ✓ Tools and coaching to assist with housing search;
- ✓ Subsidized housing applications;
- ✓ Assistance in dealing with housing problems (e.g. eviction, maintenance, illegal rent increase, discrimination);
- ✓ Information about tenants' rights and responsibilities;
- ✓ Information on emergency shelters;
- ✓ Housing search drop-in centre available during open hours, no appointment necessary (*this service has not been available since the beginning of the pandemic*);
- ✓ Free advertisement of vacant units through our housing advertisement database.

KEY FUNCTIONS

Intervention and Prevention:

- ✓ Advocate for tenants by focusing on safety, health and sustainability to prevent housing instability and housing loss; acting as intermediary to resolve landlord-tenant issues.

Counselling and Support:

- ✓ Providing tools and coaching for housing search on the private market.

Affordable Housing Applications:

- ✓ Assistance with the application process, including support with priority requests.

Facilitating Access:

- ✓ To emergency shelters, safe houses for the homeless or individuals fleeing domestic violence.

Paralegal Services:

- ✓ For tenants appearing before the Landlord and Tenant Board, the Internal Review Panel and other adjudicative bodies.

Partnerships:

- ✓ With key organizations for a multi-faceted approach to homelessness intervention.

Advocacy:

- ✓ By sitting on a variety of committees addressing current issues related to affordable housing and homelessness prevention.
